

Should you offer your employees a flu shot?

As we dive headfirst into flu season, it's important to stop and ask yourself how many work days your employees missed last year due to the flu.

What is the flu, anyway?

Influenza (that's the flu, as we know it) is a highly contagious virus that spreads from person to person via respiratory droplets released during talking, coughing, sneezing, laughing or singing.

Touching an object that is contaminated with the influenza virus and then touching your own eyes, nose or mouth can also spread influenza. People are usually contagious a few days before their symptoms begin, and for up to one week after symptoms start.

Flu season typically starts in April and runs through to October, when the temperature drops, however people can catch the flu in any month of the year.

How serious is it?

2017 was a horrible year for Australians when it came to the flu, with over 200,000 people suffering from the illness throughout the year.

Catching the flu can be very serious. Nearly 3,000 Australians die from influenza every year, and thousands more are hospitalised, so taking steps to prevent contracting the virus is very important.

So, what can we do?

Influenza vaccination is the most effective measure available to prevent against contracting the flu virus.

The flu vaccination will prepare your immune system to fight off the virus, should you get exposed to it, but it takes approximately two weeks for immunity to develop after you receive the vaccination, so the sooner you can get it the better.











Is it foolproof?

While the flu vaccination is an excellent way to prevent getting the flu, unfortunately some people may still contract it even after being vaccinated (although the severity of their flu is often much less as a result).

Because there are no guarantees, there are several other preventative initiatives you can encourage at your workplace, in addition to the flu vaccine, that will help decrease the risk of spreading the virus.

Simple things such as:

- Covering your mouth when coughing or sneezing
- Disposing of tissues immediately after use
- Keeping surfaces clean
- Avoiding sharing office equipment such as keyboards or phones
